Lowell Music Shines at Oregon School Board Association Conference

The performance took place during the general session on November 12th, the final day of the conference, before a crowd of hundreds of administrators and school board members from around the state. The Band gave a polished, professional performance that honored our own Lowell School District people in attendance, and received a rousing standing ovation at the close. Congratulations are due to the hard-working musicians and to the District personnel that support them!



More good news from Lowell Music includes the awarding of two special grants this fall. One, a \$600 grant from the Lowell-Fall Creek Education Foundation, will enable the group to purchase uniforms for competition. The second grant, from the Oregon Community Foundation, totaled \$1,000 for the purchasing of much-needed percussion equipment. Both items (uniforms and timpani) were borrowed from neighboring districts in recent years, but these funds will allow for a significant upgrade to our program. Nine Mini-Grants Awarded to Teachers

Thanks to the support of Alumni & Friends of the Lowell School District, the 2017 Hall of Fame Celebration and Banquet raised enough funds to more than double this year's award of mini-grants to teachers, while continuing to support other valuable programs. This year's mini-grants will benefit students in all four schools. At Lundy Elementary, kindergarten teachers Glenda Green and Krystle Rodriguez-Light teamed up to request money to enhance

daily Tinker Time, when students are actively involved in problem solving, learning collaboration skills, expressing creativity and mastering the skill of perseverance. "Endless STEM Challenge" packs, large LEGO boxes, "Create a Chain Reaction" STEM kits and more will help students be builders, problem solvers, team players and maybe even lead to them becoming scientists and engineers! Also at Lundy, 2nd and 3rd grade teachers Lauren Ely and Katrina Burkhardt will be purchasing Wobble chairs and cushions which allow energetic students to be able to release a bit of their energy while still staying in their seats, allowing them to have better focus and sustained attention. Sixth grade teacher, Greg Erickson, will be creating multiple stations that students will rotate through daily, reading novels and participating in literature circles. He will be accomplishing this with MP3 players and audio books.

At Lowell High School, Drama teacher Micah Klatt (far right) will enhance student productions by allowing them to learn the art of special effects makeup, including old age makeup, creature/animal makeup and more. This will not only benefit the production participants, it will also enrich the experience of all audience members at their shows. Music director Paul Burch will be able to outfit his award winning band and choir members in sharp looking uniforms without having to borrow them.



Also at the high school, Science teacher, Toni Beckett, will be purchasing a mini-centrifuge. This will allow microbiology students to take samples, spin them down to isolate their true sample and then run various tests such as electrophoresis gels to look for DNA markers. Second grade students at Mt. View Academy charter school will be enhancing their character education curriculum through actions as part of the #Capture Kindness Challenge. Materials and supplies will be purchased that will allow students to take part in the activity that goes along with the weekly Kindness Mission such as blessing a local family with a meal, treats and cards for teachers, making dog toys for the animal shelter and more.

At Bridge Charter Academy, Ryan Jackson, at left, who teaches grades 6-8 will present "Escape the Classroom". Students will work as a class to review a concept of math, science, history or language arts. Then they receive a clue to find out which team they are on (Team Trigonometry or Team Calculus for example). Once teams are chosen, the clock starts. Teams race against time and each other to solve clues to move on to the next. Clues can unlock chests, find hidden codes, direct them to a riddle, show them a task to complete and more. Whichever team opens up the final treasure chest first or gets the farthest wins.

Lowell, Fall Creek Education Foundation Board Members are delighted to be able to provide teachers with such innovative and fun ways to enhance learning. In addition to the mini-grant program, the Foundation also supports the **Imagination Library Program** which gives pre-school children, from birth to kindergarten, a free book each month so they can gain valuable reading skills before beginning kindergarten. The Foundation strongly supports the **Summer Recreation and Fitness Program** — a great way to keep students engaged, active and healthy over the summer.

Lowell City Council Actions

This report of actions taken by the Lowell City Council is a regular feature of this newsletter and is provided to inform citizens of recent decisions made by the council.

At the November 7th study session, the following topics were addressed:

- Update of the Parks and Recreation Master Plan, Update of the Land Development Code, and, Development of Business Registration Program

Study sessions are held for the City Council to receive background information on City business and to give Council members an opportunity to ask questions and express their individual views. No decisions are made, and no votes are taken on any agenda item. The public is invited to attend, however, there is generally no public comment period.

At the November 13th special meeting:

- Accepted an amended version of the Contingency Agreement with Aldrich Eike, P.C.
- Approved the expenditure of \$7,553.09 for the striping project completed by Lane County Public Works
- Directed the City Administrator to submit comments requested by Lane County regarding a Special Use Permit to Process Recreational Marijuana in Lane County
- Approved the City Administrator to submit a joint letter of intent with the City of Oakridge and RAIN Oregon to apply for the Rural Opportunity Initiative

Motions were approved 4-0. In support: Bennett, Angelini, Harris and Osgood; Absent: Burford.

Let's Talk Candle Fire Safety

Candles may be pretty to look at but they are a cause of home fires — and home fire deaths. Remember, a candle is an open flame, which means that it can easily ignite anything that can burn.

Candles and kids sometimes don't mix. Think about using flameless candles in your home. They look and smell like real candles. Never leave a child alone in a room with a burning candle. Keep matches and lighters up high and out of children's reach, in a locked cabinet.

“CANDLE WITH CARE” Blow out all candles when you leave the room or go to bed. Avoid the use of candles in the bedroom and other areas where people may fall asleep. Keep candles at least 12 inches away from anything that can burn.



IF YOU DO BURN CANDLES, make sure that you...

- Use candle holders that are sturdy, and won't tip over easily.
- Put candle holders on a sturdy, uncluttered surface.
- Light candles carefully. Keep your hair and any loose clothing away from the flame.
- Don't burn a candle all the way down — put it out before it gets too close to the holder or container.
- Never use a candle if oxygen is used in the home.
- Have flashlights and battery-powered lighting ready to use during a power outage. Never use candles.

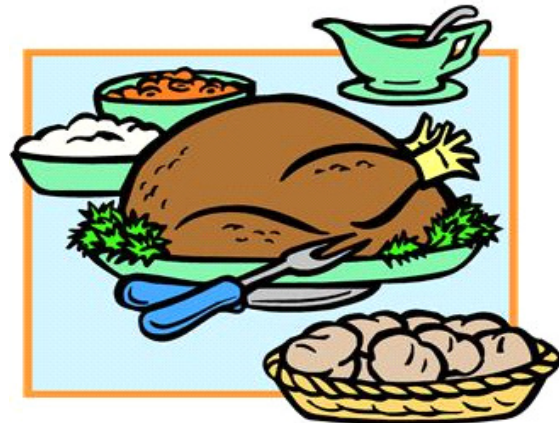
